Lighting the Candles

Today, our Prelude calls us to bring salt to Worship. Shake a little salt on your open Bible. Prepare to Let the salt of God's Word preserve, flavor, and cure your heart, soul, and mind.

Special Music

We find that instrumental music draws us out of the world and centers us in our heart of feelings.

Prayer of Confession: Teaches us to die to sin

Confession simply prepares our heart, soul, and mind to die to power of sin with Jesus who suffered all our sin. The Holy Spirit is the unseen force who leads us to see, feel, and hear our temptations.

Judgement tempts us with shame, guilt, and blame.

Condemnation is the experience of judgement tempting us to believe we are unworthy of entering God's Presence.

Sacrifice is the experience of judgement and condemnation tempting with what we must change before God will receive us into God's Presence.

Confession is awareness of God's Light shining in the darkest

regions of our heart, soul, and mind.

Prayer of Repentance: Teaches us to deny self

Repentance follows confession. Without confession we do not know what to turn from and to whom we are to turn. Jesus says that he is God in the flesh revealing God's desire for mercy.

Who are the lords of your life? To name them, remember your confession. Who are the people, groups, or institutions or nations who control you with their Judgement, Condemnation, and Sacrifices? Who determines that you are right and good or evil? These are those who persecute you. They are the ones you pray for and learn to love as God loves you through Jesus Christ.

Prayer of Mercy: Teaches us to rise in Christ

Lord, have mercy! Lord have mercy on me. I have given my persecutors and enemies power to lord over my life. I am tempted to fight, hide, and run but I cannot escape them. Their voices are in my head and heart. I long to hear you. I hunger for your Word. I thirst for your life. In your great mercy, you spoke to me. You led me to experience my temptation not to punish me, but to deliver me.

Prayer of Reconciliation: Teaches us to live in Grace

Lord, in my humanity I am vulnerable to judgement, condemnation, and sacrifice. Through Christ, my Lord, may I receive Mercy and enter your throne room of Grace where my heart, soul, and mind are healed in your Love. Spirit of the Living God, lead into the wilderness of my temptation, deliver me in Christ's mercy, restore my soul. Make me a living sanctuary on earth as it is in heaven.


