### Let's Gather School Supplies

Koni Purscell, our Church and Community Worker, has reminded us that school is just around the corner and it might be a good idea to start gathering school supplies. I was in Walmart (Norton) this week and noticed they were setting up for back to school. I'd suggest we concentrate on a few basic items: loose leaf paper, pencils, glue (bottles/sticks), and crayons. If we just get those items, especially in quantity, we should be able to really help out some kids and/or schools when they go back into session the first week of August. You can place supplies on the table in the fellowship hall we normally use for such collections.

### You are Invited to a Baptism

On Sunday afternoon August 10th, we are going to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism in a very special way. We are going to have a river baptism. Conner Clendenon has indicated that he wants to make his profession of faith and be baptized. We are currently seeking to get permission to use the river behind the Cedar Ridge Baptist Church out in Crackers Neck and we are looking at 2:00 p.m. as the time. Since baptism is a rite of the church, I would hope that some of the church members could be present for the celebration of this Sacrament. Also, if there are other persons that have not been baptized that would like to receive the sacrament, please get in touch with me and we can discuss if you are ready. Remember, in United Methodism, we only baptize one time. So if you were baptized as an infant, I cannot "re-baptize" you as an adult.

## The Romans 12 Project

### A Community That Sings

Old North United Methodist Church in Evansville, Indiana, is a mid-sized congregation with a heart for worship that is enhanced by its love of congregational singing, both a cappella and with well-accompanied pipe organ and other instruments.

The vitality and importance of congregational worship and song are fed by the church's renovated worship space, excellent acoustic and aesthetic surroundings, and the fact that they regularly use all three of the hymnals in the church's pew racks: "The United Methodist Hymnal," "The Faith We Sing," and "Worship & Song."

The church has a gifted Director of Music Ministries, Daniel Craig, who also serves as a professor of music at the University of Southern Indiana and frequently creates worship and music materials that are incorporated into the congregation's worship. His dual church-school role has provided opportunities to bring the community together in music, worship, and concert in the church sanctuary.

The congregation has used its combined assets of a passion for music, good facilities, and people with connections to the local college to reach out to the wider community. The church, college, and community have contributed to worship and concerts featuring major musical works of the classic past and the challenging present. For example, the church hosted a large First Nations Service that included newly composed music and involved the congregation, community, and a local Native American pastor and congregation. The church has also coordinated and hosted a community Taizé service for the season of Lent.

Old North UMC is thus the site of several communities: the local congregation, combined college and church, and a truly inclusive and engaging community of those within the surrounding area of Evansville.


## An Update on the Capital Campaign

## The Pastor's Thoughts on Discipleship



Since I mention baptism on the other side of this page, let me share with you some thoughts on the topic.

First of all, in Methodism, baptism (along with Communion) is a sacrament. That means that they are an outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace. In other words, we believe that something actually happens in the sacrament. We believe that God imparts grace. I could spend countless pages trying to explain that one!

Secondly, a Sacrament is something that involves God's action. In baptism, it is not the individual that is really doing anything. Neither the pastor nor the person being baptized are really in charge. Instead, it is God that is moving and acting. That is why we baptize infants. Baptism has nothing to do with the ability of the infant to understand what is going on. It has everything to do with the grace that God infuses into that infants life.

Thirdly, baptism is not repeatable. Some denominations allow for re-baptism. Some require it if you wish to join their church. In these instances, baptism is seen as a response on the part of the person. I come to know Jesus and I want to be baptized. In some churches it is seen as the way to membership. In both these cases, the focus shifts away from God and onto the person being baptized and a decision that he or she is making. It becomes a decision made by the individual rather than a grace filled action in which God is doing something.

I hope that these brief words have helped you to understand a United Methodist view of baptism. I think that it is very important for us to consider baptism and its role in making us stronger disciples. If you have any questions, then give me a call. I'd love to talk to you about this important Sacrament of the church. I also hope that you will plan to be present when Conner is baptized on Sunday August 10th.
